Editorial

Dear Reader

On behalf of the Estonian Presidency of the EUCPN, I welcome you to September issue of the EUCPN Newsletter.

This newsletter is dedicated to cyber safety which Estonian Presidency of the Council of the European Union has chosen to be the priority for the European Crime Prevention Network (EUCPN). Presidency focuses on the reduction and prevention of cybercrimes in the communities, which is in line with the EU Policy Cycle priorities to combat cybercrimes committed by organized crime groups and generating large criminal profits. We see, that dedication to this subject is essential, because cybercrime is a real and growing threat that impacts the EU's internal security and in some way all of us. Daily users of smart devices and digitalised society unavoidably are more vulnerable to new cyber threats.



Estonian Presidency has the honour to organize the exchange of crime prevention best practices around the EU under the auspice of the European Crime Prevention Award (ECPA). The ECPA has been, since the start of the EUCPN, one of the essential events of the network and reaches the important milestone of the 20th anniversary in 2017.

The projects, one per Member State, submitted to compete in the ECPA contest, should be in line with this year's Best Practice Conference (BPC) theme, i.e. cyber safety. The focus of the theme is described on the EUCPN webpage. All of the project nominations from the EU Member States should be submitted through the National Representative of the EUCPN by the deadline of 6th October 2017.

The Estonian Presidency plans to hold two Executive Committee Meetings and one Board Meeting, also a Jury meeting for evaluating the ECPA projects. BPC with separate opening

lecture is held in Tallinn on 13.-15.12.2017. In addition to the ECPA and conference there will be one toolbox and one thematic paper published on cyber safety. We hereby invite all to share with the network their policy papers on cybercrime policy in general.

During Maltese presidency the first memorandum of understanding was signed with Europol and currently, in progress, is the one with European Forum for Urban Safety (EFUS) which is relevant stakeholder for EUCPN on local level prevention. EUCPN Secretariat is growing bigger, there will be number of new personnel arriving. This is a good sign for the EUCPN and it means a lot for future collaboration on crime prevention matters in Europe.

Good thoughts and useful data - this is what the newsletter and networking is all about. Sharing is educating!

EU Policy Cycle

The completion of the internal market and the abolition of internal border controls within the countries of the European Community have created an increasing internal market within the EU. Technological and commercial developments have reduced national trade barriers, widened the transportation infrastructures and bolstered volumes of international business, also, the Internet and extensive cellular telephone networks have promoted fast communication. These developments have greatly contributed to the welfare of the EU. However the other side of these developments is the easiness in which organized criminal groups use this open space to extend their criminal activities.

In order to combat this growing organized criminality, the EU has come up with a multiannual Policy Cycle which coordinates the measures taken to prevent and combat this serious and organized crime. The following article explains you what the EU Policy Cycle is, how it works, what the current developments are for the next Policy Cycle 2018-2021 and the article also goes further into a new development which is including prevention into the Policy Cycle.

From suspicion to action - Converting financial intelligence into greater operational impact

Money laundering is one of the key 'engines of crime' sustaining global criminal business worth billions of dollars. The task of combating it has become more difficult, due to the increasingly global and virtual nature of financial services and the emergence of technology-enabled factors such as crypto currencies and anonymisation tools that frustrate the identification of beneficial owners. Controlling much of this mega-illicit activity are global money laundering syndicates, who offer their services at scale to criminal networks, and are highly adept at exploiting gaps in the financial system. These are the challenging conditions within which anti-money laundering (AML) arrangements currently operate that set a very high bar for success in curtailing the international flows of illicit funds.

It is a state university providing education and training for members of the Police Force and other security services. The graduates of the Academy acquire a unique education in security services in the field of protection of persons and property as well as security in public administration. The Academy's mission is to prepare academically qualified and professionally skilled experts for the units of the Police Force, specialized sections of the Ministry of the Interior of the Slovak Republic and other state-controlled and private security services, deliver further education, develop scientific knowledge in science disciplines and study fields, provide continuing postgraduate education by means of the PhD study, the Rigorosum study, habilitation and professors' inauguration procedures.

We precede cyberbullying



The Department of Regional Police Force in Nitra deals with cyberbullying and organises their activities within the region. Cyber space allows their potential criminals certain space for their anonymity. The potential criminals are young people. Considering the situation in our society, the potential criminals may be the people skillful at IT Technologies. That is why it is needed to concentrate on pupils and even younger ones who are still being controlled by their parents and might become criminals in their future. The real cases prove that school

institutions usually solve cases when young people record „such“ videos on their cell phones and consequently post them on the Internet. The most often form is so called „Happy slapping“. The typical feature of cyberbullying is that it is regularly repeated but in contrast with „Happy slapping“, there is a difference because it can be one-shot. Cyberbullying is usually done repeatedly and the criminal often knows the victim. This form of crime is done by youngsters but there often occur the cases with pupils aged less than 14. According to this fact I indicate the number of activities that have been done in certain target groups in order to prevent such form of a criminal behaviour. The number of prevention activities and the people questioned is from Nitra region – all the activities have been done within the year 2016 in the form of interactive dialogues and learning with the respect to the target groups.

The total number of activities was 14 and the number of the questioned juveniles was 280.

Considering the group of juveniles there were done 20 prevention activities with 440 young people.
