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Background

This EUCPN Work Programme succeeds that of March 2015. The Work Programme 2016 is in accordance with Article 4 of the Council Decision 2009/902/JHA and Article 12 of the Rules of Procedures for the EUCPN. As foreseen in the Multiannual Strategy for the EUCPN, this document defines the activities of the Network to be completed in 2016 in order to promote the achievement of the strategic goals, namely:

- A) To be a point of reference for the target groups of the Network.
- B) To disseminate qualitative knowledge on crime prevention.
- C) To support crime prevention activities at national and local level.
- D) To contribute to the EU policy and strategy of crime prevention and to contribute to various aspects of crime prevention at the EU level in respect of strategic priorities of EU.

The target groups of the EUCPN are:

- Practitioners and policymakers at the local level
- Practitioners and policymakers at the national level
- Relevant agencies, organisations, working groups etc. at European Union level

Funding

The EUCPN currently relies on the following funding sources:

- Member States who fund projects of interest to the Network
- EU financial programmes managed by the Commission (ISF – Internal Security Fund - Police, Hercule III Programme 2014-2020, Daphne, Horizon 2020 etc.)
- Work Program Fund – an internal fund established by voluntary contributions from Member States

The present Trio

The present Trio

The incoming EU Trio Presidency of the Netherlands, Slovakia and Malta have chosen the topic 'Organized Crime' as its overall theme.

During 2016:

- The Netherlands will focus on illegal trafficking of firearms. As the European Commission stated in the European Agenda on Security 2015-2020, recent terrorist attacks have focussed attention on how organised criminals are able to access and trade illegal firearms. This is a cross-border problem, given that many illegal firearms in the EU have been imported from neighbouring countries. Therefore, cooperation between member states and a common approach are of major importance in preventing illegal trafficking of firearms.

- Slovakia will focus on organized crime targeting Elderly people

Slovakia aims to focus on the prevention of crimes committed on elderly people, because the Slovak police statistics reveal an increase of the phenomenon and these crimes are often committed by organized crime groups. Elderly people are often victims of economic, property and violent crimes.

This topic is also related to the European priorities – Directive 2012/29/EU establishing minimum standard of the right, support and protections of the victims of crime.

The Dutch Presidency, January 2016 – June 2016

The Dutch Presidency, together with the incoming Presidency Trio (Slovakia and Malta), the Secretariat and EUCPN partners intends to continue the work initiated by the previous Presidencies, especially their efforts drafting the Multi Annual Strategy (MAS) 2016-2020. The new MAS gives an excellent overview of the strategy, the goals and the focus areas of the network for the years to come. The Netherlands intends to make a start with the implementation of the goals mentioned in the new MAS and the subsequent yearly Work Programmes.

The Presidency Trio will focus on Organised Crime during their Presidencies. This is one of the three topics (together with Cybercrime and Terrorism) the European Commission indicates as key priority in their European Agenda on Security 2015 – 2020. Within this topic, the Netherland will focus on the illegal trafficking of firearms.

Slovakian Presidency, July 2016 - December 2016

Slovak Presidency, together with Trio, intends to continue the implementation of the conclusions and recommendations of the Evaluation report of the EUCPN, focusing on improving its functionality and visibility.

The Slovak Presidency will:

- Organize the Best Practice Conference (BPC) and the European Crime Prevention Award (ECPA) ceremony, which are planned to take place in December 2016;
- Work on the development of a manual on the prevention of crimes committed on elderly people to ensure the circulation of best practices on this topic
- Commence a draft of the annual report together with the Dutch Presidency.

Activities in the Network in 2016

When reading this programme, you will come across four different levels of activity:

- 1) **Action:** Action points decided upon in the Multiannual Strategy (overview in annex 1) (and the recommendations arising from the Report of the evaluation of the EUCPN (2012)).
- 2) **Task:** Activities necessary to implement the action points, further development of the Network itself, or activities to prepare future action points, tasks or projects.
- 3) **Project:** Ongoing or new crime prevention activities in specific Member States and ongoing or new activities in several Member States (overview in annex 2).
- 4) **Secretariat task:** task for the EUCPN Secretariat outlined in the application for the project “The development of the observatory function of the European Centre of Expertise on Crime Prevention within the EUCPN” or in the Multiannual Strategy (overview in annex 3).

A) To be a point of reference for the target groups of the Network

Action: *Updating a database of contacts of the target group members in line with priorities of the policy cycle*

- **Task:** The Member States will update their contact list according to the priorities of the policy cycle

Action: *Continue and improve communicating with the target groups*

- **Secretariat task:** The Secretariat will issue six newsletters in 2016: three during the Netherlands presidency and three during the Slovakian presidency
- **Task:** The Secretariat will keep the website up to date and optimise its current functions with the assistance of the Board. The Member States will make sure that the Secretariat receives regular updates about the information and contacts provided.
- **Task:** the EUCPN will put more emphasis on promoting the network on social media

Action: *Updating the application of the uniform feedback tool for EUCPN communication channels and events*

- **Secretariat task:** The Secretariat will present the results from the Best Practice Conference 2015 to the Board to reflect upon and decide whether the results call for further action in relation to future events.
- **Secretariat task:** The Secretariat will evaluate the Best Practice Conference 2016.

Action: Increase the cooperation with international institutions

- **Task:** The Netherlands will invite relevant institutions to their conference on 13 April 2016.
- **Task:** The Slovakian Presidency is going to invite representatives of international institutions to the BPC-ECPA
- **Task:** Representing the EUCPN on relevant meetings organized by the stakeholders
- **Secretariat task:** The Secretariat will organise stakeholders meetings. The stakeholders meetings aim for closer relationships and exchange with stakeholders with an active involvement of all the parties to increase the coherence between policies and approaches on crime prevention on the EU-level (EU partners and EUCPN).
- **Task:** increased cooperation with Europol will be discussed

Action: *Assuming the funding is available, the EUCPN Secretariat should be further strengthened (REC13)*

- **Task:** The National Representatives will be encouraged to increase their input in the work of the EUCPN. This issue will be included on the agenda of the Board Meetings and National Representatives will be invited to discuss how to solve the difficulties raised or encountered.
- **Task:** The EUCPN Secretariat and Belgium as project manager will draft a proposition for the next EUCPN grant. This will be presented to the Executive Committee and the Board for input and feedback. Eventually it will be send to the European Commission as a respond on a call for projects.
- **Task:** The EUCPN Secretariat and the Informal Network for the Administrative Approach will identify actions which can be taken in order to strengthen both networks and increase their cooperation.
- **Task:** in light of the new grant which will result in more tasks for the EUCPN Secretariat, the presidencies will put a possible renaming of the Secretariat on the agenda.

2. Actions and tasks associated with Strategic Goal B:

➤ **Task:** The Dutch Presidency will focus on illegal trafficking of firearms. As the European Commission stated in the European Agenda on Security 2015-2020, recent terrorist attacks have focussed attention on how organised criminals are able to access and trade illegal firearms. This is a cross-border problem, given that many illegal firearms in the EU have been imported from neighbouring countries. Therefore, cooperation between member states and a common approach are of major importance in preventing illegal trafficking of firearms.

➤ **Task:** Slovakian Presidency will focus on organized crime targeting Elderly people. One of the most vulnerable groups of population which needs to be protected by prevention are the elderly people. They can become more easily victims of crime, especially because of their credulity, kindness, willingness to help, defencelessness, bad health and also for their high age. According to Slovak Criminal Code, the elderly person is the person older than 60 years and it belongs to protected persons.

Seniors in advanced age often become victims of crime and ill-treatment, what is proved by published cases of (often brutal) violence committed by foreign persons, but also by relatives. Many crimes and lot of violence committed on elderly people remains hidden and occurs in various environments, special need facilities and families.

Elderly people are victims of fraud, embezzlement, theft, robbery, coercion too. The society should ensure that elderly people are adequately informed about the measures that reduce the risk of crimes committed on them.

Action: *Review of victim surveys and research on comparable criminal statistics and fear of crime*

➤ **Secretariat task:** The Secretariat will produce a new European Crime Prevention Monitor report in 2016. This report will summarise data from different crime statistics, victim surveys and fear of crime studies.

Action: *Development of recommendations on approaching challenges of crime problems by target groups*

➤ **Task:** Development of a manual on illegal trafficking of firearms (during the Dutch Presidency)

The Secretariat will, in cooperation with the Netherlands Presidency, organise a workshop with experts specialised on this theme during the Netherlands Presidency, and will provide recommendations that can be disseminated among target group members.

- **Task:** Development of a manual on Organized crime targeting Elderly people (during Slovakian Presidency)

The Secretariat will, in cooperation with the Slovakian Presidency, organise a workshop with experts specialised on this theme during Slovakian Presidency, and will provide recommendations that can be disseminated among target group members.

Action: Presidencies who do not need to organize the BPC-ECPA will continue organizing thematic seminars about their chosen topic

- **Task:** Following the Board meeting scheduled on 12 April 2016, the Netherlands will organise a conference on 13 April 2016 in Amsterdam. The main topic of this conference will be the illegal trafficking of firearms. Furthermore the Dutch Centre for Crime Prevention and Safety (CCV) will present some best practices preventing organised crime in the Netherlands.

Action: *The EUCPN should further develop its range of outputs to increase the capacity to respond to key stakeholder needs (REC4)*

- **Task:** The Member States will proactively communicate with local practitioners and within Member States, in general, and where possible, produce summaries of key materials in the languages of MS and include on EUCPN website (REC5).
- **Secretariat task:** The Secretariat will engage with local practitioners in the course of developing toolkits or exchanges of good practices.
- **Secretariat task:** The Secretariat continues to engage with relevant institutions and respond to requests for inputs.

C) To support and facilitate crime prevention activities at national and local level

With a view to increase the preventive approach in Europe, the EUCPN will support policy makers and practitioners at national and local level. The EUCPN Secretariat is ready to assist National Representatives with knowledge and to support funding applications.

Action: *Collecting and uploading key documents that were earlier translated in national languages*

- **Task:** The Presidency in office will invite National Representatives to collect proper documents to be uploaded onto the EUCPN website.

Action: *Translation of event conclusions and recommendations*

- **Task:** the Netherlands and Slovakian Presidencies will invite National Representatives to find resources for the translation of event conclusions and recommendations of the Best Practice Conference into their national language, to be uploaded onto the EUCPN website with the support of the Secretariat.

Action: *A key EUCPN priority should be to produce good practice material for crime prevention practitioners at a regional and local level*

- **Task:** Member States should translate, where practicable, a small number of key, practical materials for eventual inclusion on EUCPN website, as well as local websites. The Dutch and Slovakian presidencies will invite National Representatives to do so.

Action: *Development of recommendations on the impact of context on crime prevention*

- **Secretariat task:** The Secretariat will start up the work on the Good practice guidelines transferability by identifying/collecting existing guidelines on this topic. The aim of the Good practice guidelines transferability is to ensure the quality and comparability of good practices, tips and tricks/do & don'ts when translating a good practice to another context will be elaborated.

Action: *Providing support and evaluations to Member States wanting to adapt projects being ECPA winners*

- **Task:** The Secretariat provides support upon request of Member States.

Action: *The funding of EUCPN supported activities should be made more transparent*

- **Task:** The funding of EUCPN supported activities will be included in the Annual Report and Work Programme.

D) To develop various aspects of crime prevention at EU level in respect of the EU strategy of crime prevention

Action: *Development and implementation of a Network management plan*

In 2012 an external evaluation of the EUCPN was carried out and the Commission submitted a report to the EU Council which sets out the results of the evaluation and its recommendations. During Ireland's Presidency in the beginning of 2013, the Action plan responding to the evaluation of the EUCPN was finalised. Lithuania's Presidency, together with the Trio and EUCPN partners, started the implementation of the Action Plan. This Action plan was updated and further implemented during 2014 and 2015.

- **Task:** The Netherlands and Slovakia assure, together with respective Trio, ExComm and the Secretariat, further monitoring of the implementation of the Action Plan. Furthermore the action plan has been added to the Multi-annual strategy 2016-2020 which serves as a basis for this Work Programme.

Action: *The EUCPN has decided to systematically align its priorities with the agreed EU priorities as regards the fight against crime (REC1)*

- **Task:** The trio will choose one EU priority to work on during 18 months. The presidencies within the trio will then translate this priority to local needs.
- **Task:** The Commissions' annual working programme will be put on the agenda during the Dutch Presidency for discussion at the Executive Committee and Board Meeting in December following its adoption by the Commission.
- **Task:** The Presidencies, with the help of the Secretariat, will include on agendas of upcoming Board Meeting relevant developments in Working Group meetings (LEWP, Genval, COSI...). National Representatives will be canvassed for agenda topics in advance of Board Meetings.
- **Task:** The EUCPN secretariat, together with the executive committee, will take the lead in the inclusion of EU priorities in the discussion on the future of the Network.

Action: *The EUCPN should develop its role in making inputs to EU and Member State policymaking in the crime prevention field (REC2)*

- **Task:** The Presidencies will invite the Board to identify one relevant EU and Member State topic per year addressing Genval and the European Commission with results.
- **Task:** the Presidency in office will inform Genval about the main activities and recommendations proposed by the EUCPN.

- **Task:** the Presidency in office, the Member States and the EUCPN-secretariat will proactively increase circulation of information on EUCPN activities/projects on national and EU-level.

Action: *A more strategic approach to determining EUCPN activities, and strengthening its role in providing inputs to policymaking at the EU and Member State level is needed therefore the EUCPN Secretariat will provide:*

- *An understanding of EU trends and across Member States with regard to crime;*
- *An overview of Member States' crime prevention institutional set-ups, strategies and policies (some of this information is already available);*
- *To the extent that can be assessed, an assessment of what impact crime prevention measures have on different types of criminal activity.*

- **Task:** The Secretariat will continue its collaboration with Eurostat.
- **Task:** The Secretariat will further develop and circulate research and outcomes. The Member States will provide the Secretariat with relevant research.
- **Secretariat Task:** An impact measurement will be produced and compared to the results of 2012 by the Secretariat.
- **Task:** The Board will annually include/update on the website an overview of Member States' Crime prevention institutional set-ups, strategies and policies.

Action: *Developing closer relationships with other European and international entities in the crime prevention field should be intensified (REC15)*

- **Task:** the Secretariat and the Presidency in office will identify and involve, depending on topics and circumstances, other crime prevention bodies in EUCPN activities.
- **Task:** the Secretariat and the Board will identify the events and other activities organised by the other organisations. The Secretariat and the Presidency, if deemed appropriate, may look for an invitation to these activities and give the possibility to the National Representatives to participate and give a presentation of the activities of the EUCPN with the aim to raise its visibility.
- **Task:** Feedback on these activities will be provided in the EUCPN Annual Report.
- **Secretariat task:** The Secretariat will organize a stakeholder meeting.

In 2005 the CoE has adopted the *Convention on Action against Trafficking in Human Beings*. The convention was complemented by the introduction of the Group of Experts on Action against Trafficking in Human Beings (GRETA), serving as a monitoring mechanism for the convention.

1. **Public opinion poll** presenting updated description of the awareness of trafficking in human beings in Poland, including an awareness assessment of vulnerable groups.

GBV and DV are problems requiring complex and well-coordinated actions by competent authorities. Despite the accumulated national practice in applying the relevant legislation for the prevention, detection, investigation, protection and assistance to victims of GBV and DV, there are existing difficulties in coordination and admission of significant lapses. This in turn leads to inefficient protection and assistance to victims and violates basic human rights guaranteed in both Bulgarian and international law. Victims of GBV and DV are often subject to re-victimization and diverse interventions by various institutions. There are some cases where the lack of timely intervention and a coordinated approach leads to severe recurrence of violence, which in turn puts victims at greater risk for health and life.

In order to address this issue the first area of the project envisages the elaboration of an assessment of the current Bulgarian legal framework, an assessment of best European practices and how they can be implemented. As result of this activities will be developed a national strategy for reduction of GBV and domestic violence. To ensure the viability of these results will be put in place proposals for the necessary amendments to the national legal framework. The second area of the project will be focus on the strengthening of the institutional capacity through improved skills of the experts that deal with victims of GBV and domestic violence. The training programs conducted during the implementation of the project will improve the professional skills of legal experts of the judiciary system, as well as that of the social workers and police officers. As an essential emphasis in the work of social workers and police officers will be the work with Roma population.

Through the trainings, all participants will gain awareness of and knowledge on gender-based violence matters in order to handle cases of such violence with professional skills and competence.

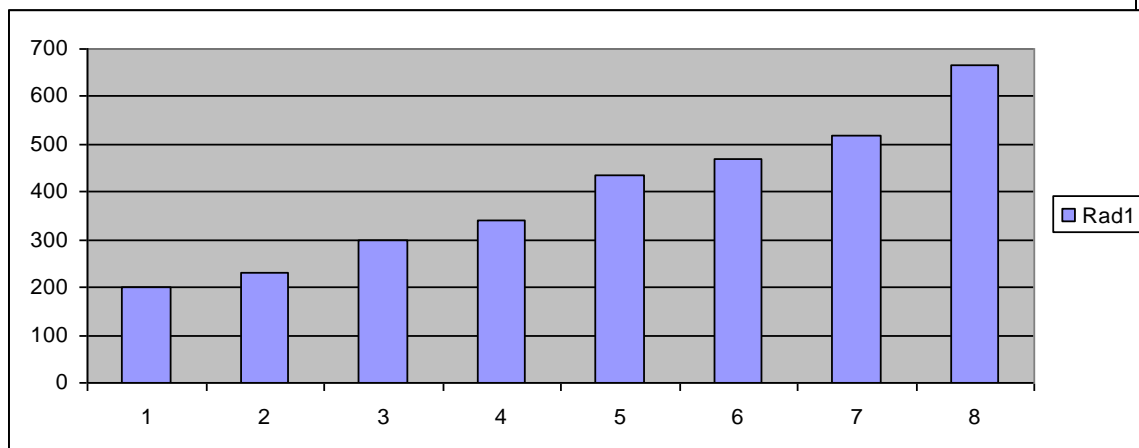

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Project 18

Project title:

Cyber jungle

Main theme:

Cybercrime

Project proposer: Poland

Project leader(s): The Municipal Police in Szczecin

Project supporter(s): The Schools Headmasters

Project scope:

The "Cyber jungle" project is aimed at the younger Internet users, their carers as well as people taking part in their education and attitudes shaping. Its mission is to improve the overall security of the Internet users, especially those who are not properly prepared for it.

This set includes the surrounding reality: young people and children do not know the hazard and their parents - who in the accompanying circumstances had not followed the development of this medium - are remaining in ignorance with respect to its capabilities and threats. It is a form of family dysfunction in terms of proper childcare.

Therefore, the security is based on many factor program components and is constructed of three main elements:

1. Increasing awareness of the program participants about the perils related with the Internet used by children and young people as well as improving the safety of its users. It is also one of the objectives of the program.
2. Activating parental control over minors benefiting from the resources and engineering data tools.
3. Introduction of the correlation element in the usual utilization of Internet resources by individual users in a secure direction to each family or group of users.

According to this plan different security levels are achieved by developing the ability to accurately search for specific information preventing contact with the unwanted content. This problem affects mostly youngest children, who should be able to precisely follow specific knowledge resources without the risk of contact with violence, pornography, etc.

Older users should have the ability to assess legal aspects of their activity on the

network often balancing on the edge of admissibility.

Another area of impact is developing capacity to assess the risk when establishing virtual relationships and ability to conduct correspondence in a secure manner, i.e. without disclosure of sensitive data as well as creative and save use of defence mechanisms against process of grooming.

The whole project includes the need to develop mechanisms for sharing resources and information technology tools with the minors and their guardians in such a way that the use, for example, of the social network did not facilitate the acquisition of knowledge about the family.

The program is implemented through meetings and workshops with minors, and then with their carers and educators. This gives them the opportunity to acquire knowledge, which parents and guardians do not have, and use it during meetings that are conducted in a form of small talks with the use of multimedia technologies.

"Cyber jungle" handbook for parents was also published as well as "Cyber jungle" and "Cyber security" educational materials for parents and people interested in the issues.

These publications contain information that introduce people who had no contact with the network before into the secrets of virtual reality. This message shows concepts for the average reader with a view to identify opportunities to supervise minors' online activities.

Project outcomes:

Multimedia tools including instruments of social communication within the Internet might form the germ of crime. They allow young people to gain knowledge about the world, help to create their own system of values, shape attitudes and skills.

Due to their role in the modern world, especially in the education, they should be seen not only in terms of inexpressible possibilities and creating enormous opportunities, but also in terms of the hazards and risks and the potential use by criminal environment. Therefore, the objective of the project is to improve awareness of criminal responsibility for the behaviour exhibited on the Internet having comprehensive hallmarks of offences. The premises of the plan are also directed at widening the knowledge of adult users such as parents and educators about all the popular environments used by young people in a risky manner, which in turn grants them to work out effective supervision over them and shape their proper attitudes.

An important aspect of the plan is also teaching the ability to protect sensible information that can be used as a tool for criminal actions of certain groups.

The program calls for evolution of the ability to measure the importance of data transferred on the web (for criminal circles) about actual life. The adult participants have the opportunity (in the form of workshops) to understand how to have correspondence oriented for sensitive data acquisition, in a veiled way.

- Familiarise themselves with websites and portals used by young people and together with the leader conduct risk analysis for establishing the risky relationships, especially by younger users.
- They familiarize themselves with popular games and their narrative. They participate in a multimedia show that in an attractive way enriches their knowledge about the Internet.

This leads ultimately to establishing the authority of the parent/guardian oriented to the virtual reality, who becomes a partner for younger generation in the conversation.

So built family relationships allow common online activity, particularly in the field of social networks in such a direction that the information put up on them by individual household members do not complement each other and does not turn into a reliable image of the family in the network and the actual world which contributes to eliminate the dangers presented by the Internet.

Timescales and key milestone dates:

The level of execution of the project is measured by assessing the number of interested schools in terms of divisions and statistical information concerning the act committed by juvenile offenses including acts committed via the Internet in Szczecin.

- In 2013 we conducted 16 meetings
- In 2014 we conducted 17 meetings,
- In the first half of 2015 year, 39 meetings were carried out

Crime Statistics:

- In the first half of 2013 the overall number of offenses committed by juvenile offenders was 436 208.
- In the first half of 2014 the number fell to 257 offenses committed by 126 juvenile offenders.
- In the first half of 2015 154 offenses were committed by 64 perpetrators.

A large downward movement is visible. It should be mentioned that in the above mentioned period, there were no common offenses committed via the Internet made by juvenile perpetrators, i.e.:

- Criminal offenses of article 286 § 1 of the Penalty Code (fraud),
- Art. 267 of the Penalty Code (theft of data),
- Art. 268 of the Penalty Code (violation of the right to learn the information through the demolition, removal, damage or change in the records).

The project is still in the implementation phase, which followed the needs reported by institutions interested in taking part in the plan. The potency of the meetings can provide information from the schools indicating the change in students' attitudes and common and consistent functioning of parents in improving parental control and a reduction of offenses given by minors despite the growth in Internet usage. Execution of the project is proceeding in conformity with its aims.

Funding issues:

With regard to project preparation and the training of tutors it is not possible to calculate the exact costs due to the fact that the coordinators realize the project while performing their duties.

The project is planned to be financed with own funds of The Municipal Police in Szczecin.

Notes

"Cyber jungle" preventive program is an initiative aimed at children and young people and their carers. The program is designed to raise the level of safety. It is carried out in a form of meetings and workshops with children, youth and their parents, carers and teachers. A simple, accessible language and talks about difficult issues are one of the

advantages of the program. The people conducting the meetings communicate content tailored to the age and educational level of the audience. The project consists of several components. The first task is to improve awareness of the risks associated with the Internet use by children and young people as well as improving the safety of its users. The second element is to activate parental control over children who use the Internet and develop mechanisms for joint use of it by children and their caregivers. The third one is to improve relations inside the family and build the authority of the parent who is familiar with the specifics of virtual environments of the youth. This way he/she becomes a partner for the teenager in a conversation about the problems.

The Project is dedicated to students, students' parents, teachers and principals of junior secondary schools within the Elbląg municipal commune.

The anticipated number of beneficiaries encompassed by the project – 2000 students, parents and teachers of junior secondary schools within the Elbląg municipal commune.

Project outcomes:

Running the wide range of activities intended to increase awareness among the principals and the teachers of junior secondary schools as well as the students and their parents regarding the legal and penal consequences related to cyber-violence. On top of that, undertaking by the principals and the teachers the educational and preventive measures that would disseminate the principles of using modern communication technologies in a safe way to the students and their parents and would determine the threats resulting from using the said modern communication technologies.

The main outcome stemming out from the activities within the project will be enhanced legal awareness among the students and their parents about cyber-violence from the point of view of a victim and a perpetrator.

Timescales and key milestone dates:

The activities to be completed within the Project have been scheduled to commence on 1st January 2016 and to terminate on 31st December 2016 and they will be implemented in the second semester of the school year 2015/2016 to be continued in the first semester of the school year 2016/2017.

Funding issues:

Financial means indispensable to implement the Project amount to 9,000 Euro and encompass the following:

- elaboration of information bulletin, procedures, information leaflets, visual materials, amount – 2,500 Euro
 - educational spot and its presentation, amount – 1,250 Euro
 - awards for the participants in the competition for dramatic forms related to cyber-violence, amount – 3,750 Euro
 - renting the main stage of the theatre for the final gala, amount – 1,500 Euro
- Additionally, the down-payment in the Project will cover the work performed by the teachers and the officers of the Municipal Headquarters of Police in Elbląg as well as the financial means obtained from the programme “Safe Elbląg” – 15,000 Euro

Notes

Analysis of the information uploaded to the Internet and disseminated by young people, including the students of junior secondary schools, devoid of penal and legal awareness of the consequences stemming out from the information published, easy access to modern communication devices and the Internet as well as the feedback obtained from principals and teachers remain the basis for elaborating the project dealing with widely understood cyber-violence.

The Project devised, having the Municipal Headquarters of Police in Elbląg, The Group of Technical Schools in Elbląg, the Municipal Authorities in Elbląg and local junior secondary schools as partners, will be subject to evaluation process after its termination which is going to reveal the degree to which the assumed objectives have been achieved. The evaluation method has been planned already and will involve the surveys to be carried out within the target groups of the project, i.e. students, parents and teachers. The evaluation of the project as far as its educational features are concerned will constitute one of the assessment elements, which is going to be completed by School Inspectorate

in Olsztyn.

Any activities encompassed by the project, i.e. educational scenes, lectures, discussions, competition in dramatic forms and its deciding are intended to be completed in line with assumptions and schedules. Assumed main and detailed project objectives are going to be reached as well.

Anybody can become a victim of cyber-violence. Instead of building up relations, the Net is more and more often becoming a trap. Rapid development of modern media, the Internet especially, has generated new threats. Dangerous, pathological behaviour like aggression and violence has gained new tools and, hence, adopted new forms. The phenomenon was diagnosed only several years ago and is nowadays referred to as "cyber-violence". It involves electronic aggression demonstrated by stalking, harassment, mockery and bullying. Anonymity and impunity of the perpetrators strongly contributes to the proliferation of the phenomenon. Hence, it may affect anybody. However, children and the youth remain among those who are mostly exposed to the threat therefore it is necessary to establish efficient counteractive measures having the form of various programmes and preventive and educational actions.

The Municipal Headquarters of Police in Elbląg jointly with the Group of Technical Schools in Elbląg intend to prepare the preventive programme for the students of junior secondary schools entitled "Cyber-violence – how it counteract it?", which is to be implemented during the school years 2015/2016 and 2016/2017.

The main objectives of the programme shall encompass:

- 1) providing credible information about the essence, forms and scale of cyber-violence as the phenomenon,
- 2) visualisation of the threats related to taking advantage of electronic tools,
- 3) demonstrating the moral aspects of cyber-violence as the form of harming another person,
- 4) informing about the legal consequences stemming out from cyber-violence,
- 5) shaping proper personal and social attitudes of active counteractions to any demonstrations of electronic aggression and violence,
- 6) shaping the abilities to use electronic media in a safe manner,
- 7) limiting the tendencies to proliferate electronic aggression within the youth in

Elbląg,

- 8) determination of effective forms to counteract electronic aggression and violence and to help their victims,
- 9) determination of efficient procedures for schools when cyber-violence has been detected among their students,
- 10) elaboration of procedures defining the measures to be taken when cyber-violence has occurred.

We intend to take the following actions within the aforementioned programme:

- 1) preparation of the scenarios for educational scenes demonstrating verified forms of cyber-violence,
- 2) preparation of a multimedia presentation related to the programme
- 3) lectures on cyber-violence – to be made by a representative of the Municipal Headquarters of Police in Elbląg,
- 4) preparation and sending out the regulation of the municipal competition in dramatic scenes entitled “Cyber-violence – how to counteract it”,
- 5) elaboration of the syllabus and the schedule for the meetings to be held in junior secondary schools and rehearsing the groups of students from the Group of Technical Schools in Elbląg,
- 6) performing the scenes related to various forms of cyber-violence – the scenes are to be prepared by the students from the Group of Technical Schools in Elbląg,
- 7) holding the discussions on the issues within the meetings with the students of the junior secondary schools, during which the said scenes are to be performed, information obtained from the lectures and the multimedia presentation is going to be disseminated – meetings to be moderated by a representative of the Municipal Headquarters of Police in Elbląg,
- 8) The Project shall be summarised by the finale and deciding on the drama competition entitled „Cyber-violence – how to counteract it?” - the said competition assumed the preparation and performance of educational scenes related to electronic violence among the youth. Teachers and students of junior secondary schools, supported by a representative of the local theatre, will prepare a play which is to be evaluated by professional jury. The scenes will be performed on the stage in the theatre in December 2016. Individual and team winners will be selected.

Educational materials will be prepared within the project as bulletin , brochures, leaflets and surveys devoted to cyber-violence as well as the files containing the procedures for tutors, educators, school psychologists, teachers and school principals.

The programme to be implemented in the junior secondary schools as first will contribute to taking regular preventive measures which will make students, parents and teachers aware of safe ways of using electronic communication forms and will determine the threats posed by taking advantage of various communication technologies. The preventive and educational programme will constitute the basis to the principals of junior secondary schools and their teachers for the implementation of action plans to counteract cyber-violence.

The subjects tackled upon by the project , their up-to-date character and the range will make the undertaking cover the entire city. However, it may be used by other local government as the so called “ good practice”. In order to enhance the status of the programme , we are going to ask the President of Elblag to become its honorary patron.

The project to be implemented and the activities to be executed within the Municipal Commune of Elblag have not been enforced so far in a similar manner. Its unique and innovative features result from the involvement of many parties, i.e. the youth, teachers, parents, Police officers, the authorities of the province and the city, educational authorities, theatre and the media.

In order to share experience and good practices , the Group of Technical Schools in Elblag has been cooperating with a German partner, namely the Institution to Promote Vocational Education in Frankfurt on Oder. The partners in the project, the Municipal Headquarters of Police and the Group of Technical Schools in Elblag, have been cooperating with a partner from Bulgaria. The collaboration with foreign partners has brought tangible results through the acquisition of new vocational, cultural and linguistic experiences and gaining new skills in education and didactics.

3. Your social network activities will be noticed on the wall visible to you and your guardian angels.
4. If you will not be active for a longer period of time (24, 48 hours), website will ask your guardian angels to contact you to find out, if you are safe.

Efus is very well placed to work with local authorities and sport organisations towards the reduction of violence, racism and intolerance by means of practices and expertise

exchange. This project sets up a partnership in line with the aim of the Sport Collaborative partnerships fostering collaboration between sport organisations and local authorities.

Efus will involve as much local authorities as possible through their participation in the 1st European Prize for Social Integration through Sport. LIAISE will create a European network of local and regional authorities by bringing together 18 cities, 3 regions, 5 associations of cities and 3 thematic NGOs; in total, 29 partner organisations from 10 countries, embedded into the Efus network of more than 250 local authorities in Europe and its national Forums. The network will be launched and brought to life through the activities of the LIAISE2 and shall subsequently continue its work as part of the European Forum. This network will subsequently continue its work as part of the Efus. It would complement the RAN, which does not include a network of local authorities in its working group system.

Organising 18 training sessions in 9 countries

During the first phase of work in the partner cities, training will be delivered for the stakeholders of the local multi-agency prevention partnerships in each partner city and representatives of guest cities. A total of 18 training sessions in 9 countries will be organised, based on the training modules currently being developed as part of the LIAISE project.

Setting up a resource webpage for local authorities

At the same time, a European resource webpage will be developed. It will bring together available knowledge and tools, local practices and serve as a platform for dialogue for the project's partners.

Implementing pilot initiatives to prevent violent radicalisation in 17 European cities and regions

During the second phase of work in the partner cities, the local authorities will launch a local prevention initiative based on the received training and their analysis of the local situation.

Organising 5 European thematic seminars

Over the two years of the project, 5 European thematic seminars will provide a space for European exchange and dialogue and political discussion. They will be occasions for the "European local authorities against extremism" – to present itself and the work accomplished and to reach out to other European local and regional authorities as well as to other national and European stakeholders.

Communication, documentation and dissemination

During the third phase of work in the partner cities, the implemented activities will be documented and reviewed by the cities in cooperation with Efus and the expert partners. The knowledge gained in this way will be documented and disseminated.

People often go to police stations for bad and negative reasons and with this program with invite all to came to police stations for positive reasons.
